## Cups Giuseppe Mistretta

The cups are one of her favourite toys. They're incredibly simple but that allows the imagination to find a number of uses for them. There are nine cups of various sizes and colours. They slot in one another, making a compact object when together or a sprawling mass when apart.

The largest cup is red, then orange, yellow, green, purple, blue, red, orange and yellow. It's slightly strange that the three smallest cups are the same colour as the three largest ones. Although it's as if the pattern has stopped and started again, which is logical.

Inside each cup are two holes. Also when I turn a cup over revealing the bottom, there's the head of an animal. From smallest to largest, the animals are mouse, duck, monkey, cat, dog, zebra, bear, tiger and giraffe. The holes have a number of functions. She moved as the flowing water was trickled on hat and back. After a short time she became accustomed to the sensation and focused her attention on to the other cups.
